



Chords: Early Beginner Shapes











Chords: Strumming Exercises

Every time we count, it is called a <u>beat</u>. A grouping of four counts is called a <u>Bar</u>. Remember, the word "major" doesn't need to be stated in the chord name.

• GENERAL NOTES

- Names for Parts Of The Guitar can be varied to suit the tutor's preference.
- If students wish to learn difficult songs, tutors should teach them only basic versions that involve picking the bass notes of chords/riffs.
- Content to memorise: Parts of the guitar, string names (poem allowed), chord shapes (incl. names).
- All items listed here should be on an as-need basis. Some students will respond well to structure, others will work better by simply learning one new item each week.
- Some task listed may be skipped.

• LESSON ROUTINE GUIDE

- Introduction/ice breaker.
- Quiz: Identify and name parts of the guitar, string names.
- Quiz: Identify which string is being played for the E Major scale.
- Practice scales ascending and descending (if capable) three times each.
- Practice chord shapes individually. Then as progressions if necessary.
- Revise and practice previously learnt songs. Focus on ones that they have difficulty with.
- Learn new songs.
- Revise new content before concluding the lesson.

• EXERCISES

- Quiz student on the parts of the guitar and the names of the strings (Both the rhyme and the normal letters of the alphabet). Ensure they know which E is high and low.
- Quiz student on what a scale is.
- Quiz student on chords, ensuring they know which shape correlates to the correct name.
- Ask student to play and example of strumming or picking.
- Ask student to find/play a string. e.g. D string.
- Ask student to find a fret. e.g. 5th fret.
- Ask student to find/play a particular fret on a string. e.g. 5th fret on the D string.
- Ask student to pick the low E string 4 times without they hand coming off the guitar. Increase the number of notes played to 5, 10, 20 etc. Increase the difficulty by having them hold various fret numbers on the Low E eg. "hold 3 and play 10 times without your picking hand coming off".
- Ask student what the vertical and horizontal lines are on a chord diagram.
- Tutors may make up some strumming patterns and chord progressions for students to practice.

	Capable of identifying and distinguishing between a chord and a note upon up to five listenings.
